

# Waenhuiskrans / Arniston Community Development Trust

## Overview 2020



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The Trust's projects yielded positive results despite 2020's disruption. The exception is Fish House, which is still being delayed.

## Scholarships

Preliminary results indicate that 37 out of 39 bursary students will pass.

Most students studied in confinement from home and adapted to unfamiliar circumstances. For example, some first-year students from the Cape Peninsula University of Technology (CPUT) were not on campus at all this year. The campus of the University was closed before the pandemic due to student protests and afterwards in isolation.

Another example is Amanda Afrika, in her fourth year of medicine at Stellenbosch University. She already completed her theoretical examinations for the fourth year in July and completed the theoretical works for the fifth year for the rest of the year. In 2021, she will be doing the fourth and fifth years of practical work for the full year. She is now doing a clinical rotation in the Mossel Bay practice of her brother, dr. Wilhelm Afrika, who previously graduated with the help of the Trust (photo on the cover page).

Six undergraduate students are graduating this year. Courtney Lourens has already been admitted to LLM in 2021 at Stellenbosch University. Ariel Smith (BA) will also continue her studies next year.

Despite the disruption, most bursary students have completed their academic work by 2020, although some will only write exams in the new year.

### **School program**

The Trust wanted to support a learning enrichment program at Wagenhuiskrantz Primary in 2020 and establish a classroom for learning enrichment. However, Covid-19 disrupted this program.

Dr Milandr  Vlok, a lecturer at the KSUT, was going to present the program but because of the closing of the school encouraged learners to take part in an international program in which children express their feelings about the pandemic. Read Dr Vlok's report in the appendix.

### **Support for community projects**

In 2020, the Trust expanded its support for community projects. It includes the development of skills and capabilities in the Fishermen's Union. The Fishermen's Union is a critical governing body in the community.

### **Archive**

The Trust continued to build on the archive of historical documents of Waenhuiskrans' history and surroundings. In Fish House the archive will be accessible to residents, visitors, scholars and students.

## Fish House

Fish House is still delayed. The court application for review of decisions was not finalised this year.

## Funding for projects

The Trust secures funding for each project. When donors generally donate to the Trust, the trustees decide how to best use the funds for the community. Donors can also indicate in writing if they would like to donate money for a specific project. The Trust continuously needs funds to support students with scholarships. The project for learning enrichment at the school is a new project to which donors can contribute.

## Finance

In the 2019-2020 financial year, the Trust allocated R665 000 directly, mostly for bursaries, as well as R549 000 to support projects in the community. In the previous financial year, these allocations were respectively R613 000 and R104 000.

At year-end, the Trust had R1.4 million in cash. The bulk of that amount is earmarked for the completion of Fish House.


## Supervision

The Trust is registered with the Master of the Supreme Court (IT3854 / 2004); at the Department of Community Development (042-478-NWO); and to the Receiver of Revenue, in terms of sections 30 and 18a of the Income Tax Act.

The auditors of the Trust are PricewaterhouseCoopers Inc. (Reg No. 1998/012055/21). The audit is conducted in accordance with the requirements of generally accepted accounting practices (GAAP). The trustees are Colin Bird, André Marthinus, Ilze Baatjies, Jean Craven and Hannes van Zyl. Vivian Lourens, a trustee and former chairman of the Fishermen's Union, passed away in 2020.

## In closing

The Trust continues to support the community with meaningful projects. The trustees' trust Fish House will be completed and stimulate economic growth in the community.

## **A REPORT ON THE CREATIVE ARTS PROJECT LAUNCHED AT WAGENHUISKRANZ PRIMARY SCHOOL - APRIL TO MAY 2020.**



It is with much humbleness and gratitude towards the Arniston Community Development Trust (WACDT) and Mr. Andre Marthinus (school principal) that I report on the creative arts project, launched at Wagenhuiskranz Primary School during the COVID-19 LEVEL 4 lockdown. This project formed part of the International Corona Multimedia Showcase <https://coronashowcase.org/>

launched in Canada. The goal of the project was to enable children from all over the world to make their 'voices' heard about their experiences of the pandemic and to show their resilience through the expression of their creativity. Over a period of four weeks children (ages 6 to 14 years) from Kassiesbaai were provided with resources and guidelines for art activities that they could do at home. Participants received their 'art activity box' when they came to the soup kitchen and returned the project that they had made each week (see photo's attached). There were eventually 22 children who took part in the project. They each receive a certificate of participation. The main challenge was continuous communication between myself and the families because it was predominantly the children who came to the school to collect food. I would have hoped for more family engagement.

Initially before lockdown, a creative arts program was to be launched during the March and September school holidays. These two programs were to form part of the creative arts learning intervention centre being established at the school. The aim of the centre is to provide learning support to the children through the expression of their creativity (visual and performing arts). Prior to lockdown various creative arts resources were purchased from the donation of R40 000 made to the school by the WACDT. The donation enabled me to initiate the Corona Multimedia Showcase project at the school and set up the first phase of the creative arts learning centre. Hopefully in 2021 more creative arts projects can be initiated at the school. Manpower, teacher training and time constraints are some of the challenges that would need to be addressed. From the side of the children, there is curiosity and creativity in abundance!!! A friend of mine's mother, Gerda Oosthuizen, age 88 was so inspired by the children's creativity that she knitted 35 bears, hats and mittens for each child. The children will receive them on the last day of school together with their certificates.
